The Pastor's Pen....

I like the Letter of St. James. It's clear and doesn't pull punches by which I mean that it says what it means and means what it says. This weekend's section in particular focuses on the rich and powerful. It condemns their abuse of their wealth and privilege and the way in which they have profited from cheating their workers and others too powerless to resist them.

The Good News of God given in Jesus Christ looks to the establishment of the Kingdom/Reign of God in our world. It's always a work in progress, always something that's coming. As Baptised Christians we are meant to be contributing in whatever way that we can to the unfolding of God's plan and Reign in our times. God's Kingdom is based on a vision of justice, for without justice tempered by mercy we can never have a true and lasting peace amongst us.

In Australia we have, uniquely in the whole world, enjoyed decades of uninterrupted economic growth and prosperity. Sadly, this wealth has become ever more concentrated into the hands and pockets of a few. Whatever 'trickle down' was supposed to mean and do, it hasn't happened in the main. Real wages haven't kept pace with production and profits, the middle class, a one time hallmark of our egalitarian society, is fast disappearing as the gap between the haves and have nots further widens.

Moreover, the rush to privatise, meaning the selling off our Public assets into private hands, has produced miserable, crooked results as the Banking and Insurance Royal Commission reveals every day, and as does the sky-rocketing energy prices we're forced to pay. Housing, too, has seen astronomical price growth in most cities, whilst Public Housing was cut back in the name of some weird budget balancing act and in a self-indulgent effort by various levels of our Government to appease the powerful who are thought able to swing votes. Along with these trends Media rules have vastly reduced the variety of voices we're fed, concentrating opinion and news into just a couple of hands. Australia now ranks only after China and Egypt in this matter. Nothing to be proud about in this I should think. As for the treatment and 'lift' required for our own Indigenous Australians, we've gone little further in the last 40 years, but we've certainly gone around and around in a lot of useless and wasteful circles.

This year our Australian Bishops speak about homelessness in our country. It affects all of us because it could be one of us or one of our family or friends at any time. All it would take is an economic, health or similar life set-back to put us on the path to homelessness. Remember, too, that homeless persons reside in every community and Parish. In fact, less than two months ago I spoke to you in my homily at that time of homelessness in our Parish. Yes, there are homeless persons in Chelmer, Graceville, Sherwood, Corinda and Oxley. Whist the figures say that there are many places with a larger number of homeless people than in our little area (Darra, Wacol and Inala to name a few) we are not immune. Moreover, we travel to, shop, work and play in many of those other suburbs where homeless people are seeking shelter.

Jesus and the Holy Family were refugees without a stable home for a time, as St. Matthew's Gospel says. They were also homeless in Bethlehem at the time of Jesus birth, reliant on whomever could put them up. In the Gospels Jesus tells us that whilst He was preaching and healing He was homeless, having nowhere to lay His head from one night to the next. In fact, we learn that He relied on the family and house of Peter at Capernaum when in Galilee, and on His friends Martha and Mary at Bethany when visiting Jerusalem. When He was 'on the road' as He and His disciples so often were, I guess that they slept out in the fields or hoped for a roof and bed from a kindly stranger.

What can we do about any of this? This is a very fair question to ask if we're going to make a difference to this sad situation, furthering justice and peace for all, the vision and promise of God's Reign.

1. A good start would be to read the Social Justice Statement for this year, "A Place To Call Home" available at the doors of the church, or on-line at the Australian Catholic Bishops Conference (ACBC) website (see back page).

2. Doing something to get in and help our local conference of the St. Vincent de Paul Society is another way that we can help. They are always desperate for your support, and by that I mean your membership, as well as your prayers, donations and financial contribution.

3. Lastly, don't discount your voice. Phone, or better still, visit your local member of Parliament and express your concerns about the dire shortage of affordable housing. This is a Local, Federal and State matter, because it can only be alleviated by all people working effectively together at all levels of Government, and with helping agencies and charities.

Social Justice starts at home, and helping the homeless to find a home is a major step in the right direction towards creating a better, more equitable and humane society. Let's never forget the mission and task that God has given to us as God's family; to make a home fit for humanity out of the house of the world we have received and in which, for a time, we all must live.

St. Joseph's Church Closure: 1st - 12th October: The present very old and deteriorated Sanctuary carpet will be lifted at St Joseph's and replaced by a stone tiled surface. Work on this project is scheduled to commence on Monday 1st October and will take a full 10 working days.

This means that we will be unable to have Masses and services of any kind in St. Joseph's Church between Monday 1st October to Friday 12th October. Weekday Masses during this period will all be celebrated at Christ the King Church, Graceville, at the usual times, as will any funerals that may occur.

All four Masses on the weekend of 6th & 7th October will also be held at Christ the King Church, again at the usual times, 6pm Saturday, 8am, 9.30am and 6pm Sunday.

I trust that advance notice of this project will allow you to plan ahead for these days and the one weekend affected. I'm confident that the results will be worth this small inconvenience to our routines.

It's worth noting that there is as yet no decision regarding the floor surface of Christ the King Church, the present carpet also badly in need of some form of replacement. I'll do my best to let you know when this will be happening. I'll also update you on the St. Joseph's project should any changes to the above dates be necessary, these sorts of works tending to have a timing all their own.

Did you know that the month of October is traditionally devoted to the Rosary? Our parish's young people will have a unique opportunity to experience the month of the Rosary with a special activity. This activity will allow the children to make their very own set of Rosary beads! These rosary beads will be unique and individual to each child that participates as they will be able to choose from a range of bright and colourful beads.

We are currently seeking expressions of interest for those children that would like to participate in this activity. We will gather a group together for 1 -1.5 hours at 6.30pm on Thursday 11th October, explain the meaning of the Rosary and then teach the children to make their own Rosary beads that they can take away with them. Costs for participation in this activity are \$10 per child with the exception of those currently enrolled in the Sacramental Program, whose costs are covered by the Sacramental Program fee.

Lead your Church into a hope-filled future, that we may live the joy of the Gospel.





The Statement reflects the deep concern of our Bishops at the growing problem of homelessness and insecure housing in Australian society. All over our nation, people are struggling to find secure and affordable housing, whether they live in cities or in regional areas. That struggle has a corrosive effect on family life, on employment, on study and on our capacity to contribute to and benefit from our society. At its worst, the struggle leaves the vulnerable in our society homeless – sleeping on the street, in cars or in doorways, or hoping for a space on someone's couch or floor. The last Census showed the number of homeless Australians had increased to more than 116,000 people.

We pray that Australia will hear the challenges that this Statement offers: to confront an economy that has allowed housing to become out of the reach of so many; to reach out, like the Samaritan, to the wounded and helpless; and to call on our governments to make hard decisions that will allow everyone in our communities to find secure accommodation. The Statement's concluding sentence is a message for all of us: 'Everyone deserves a place to call home'.
