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The Tastor's Ten....

Word of God Sunday in the Australian Church.

Word of God Sunday 2023 by Fr Brendan Byrne SJ

The theme that runs through the Scripture readings today is clearly that of "light". We can see it in the First Reading ("then will your light shine like the dawn"), in the opening verse of the Responsorial Psalm and (with reference to Christ), in the Gospel Acclamation verse ("I am the Light of the world"), all building up the climactic statement in the Gospel: "You are the light of the world". Only the Second Reading 1 Cor 2:1-5 stands apart.

The First Reading, from Isaiah 58:7-10, features one of the great appeals for social justice in the Old Testament. Israel has complained that much fasting on her part has met with no response from God. In reply God explains the kind of "fast" Israel needs to undertake: not one involving penitential ritual, but a "fast" from injustice. Refraining from indifference and violence towards the weak, and a positive program of hospitality, will cause Israel's "light to shine like the dawn" and her "wound" to be "quickly healed over". In a way that has lost nothing of its challenge for us today, the prophetic text insists that if a community gets social justice right, then all else will fall into place.

Israel is reminded that when social justice prevails her "light rises in the darkness". Here we have, surely, an echo of the belief, expressed above all in Isaiah's Servant Songs, that Israel's destiny is to be "a light to the nations" (Isaiah 42:6; 49:6; 51:4; 60:3). The prophet, then, is summoning Israel, to realise her true vocation through the implementation of social justice. She is to become a "light to the nations" by modelling before the world what a truly flourishing human society should be.

It is at this point that the prophetic text becomes relevant as a background for the brief extract from the Sermon on the Mount that forms the Gospel from Matthew 5:13-16. Two images — "salt" and "light" — dominate the extract. They follow immediately upon the Beatitudes (Matthew 5:3-12), with which the Sermon began. The community of disciples is not just to be something for itself. In continuity with the vocation of Israel, the Church has the vocation both to preserve ("salt") and to model ("light") something for the rest of the world.

To appreciate this, we have to recall the setting in which the Sermon takes place: the mass of burdened, afflicted humanity described as the recipients of Jesus' healing at the end of the preceding chapter (Matthew 4:23-25). It is the sight of these crowds and their needs that prompts Jesus to address his disciples in the way that follows.

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The implication is that it is people who are prepared to live according to the dispositions and attitudes pronounce "blessed" in the Beatitudes — that is, people prepared to live in the vulnerable, non-grasping way they propose — who can really help lift humanity's burdens, thereby becoming and remaining "salt of the earth" and "light of the world". (Paul's description in the Second Reading [1 Cor 2:1–5] of the vulnerable way in which he approached the community in Corinth actually illustrates this disposition.)

To appreciate what Jesus says about salt we have to recall the role this item played in food preservation before refrigeration. Salt can hardly lose its taste but it may be so mixed with other elements as to become impure and so good only for salting the path outside the house, where people will trample it underfoot. Disciples who fall away from their vocation may face a similar fate.

In biblical tradition Jerusalem was the archetypal "city built on a hilltop". When the Temple was illuminated — as during the Feast of Tabernacles — Jerusalem was indeed "the light of the world". The disciples' good works must function as a lamp giving light to a darkened world — not to draw attention to themselves, but to lead outsiders to the knowledge and praise of God who has set them to be salt and light for the world.

This wonderful set of readings challenges us, not only as individuals but as parish and other communities, to reflect upon our vocation to be, according to the Second Vatican Council's description of the Church, "the Light of the Nations" (Lumen Gentium), "salt of the earth".

OUR LADY OF THE SACRED HEART: the painting seen on the right was commissioned by the parish in 1997 on the occasion of the 80th Jubilee of the Daughters of Our Lady of the Sacred Heart in Corinda. The painting depicts the image of Our Lady of the Sacred Heart which appears on the medal worn by the Sisters. Since 1997 this painting has hung in the Clewley Street Convent.

The Daughters of Our Lady of the Sacred Heart arrived in Corinda in January 1917. On 28th January 1917 (106 years ago last weekend) Archbishop James Duhig blessed the original Corinda Convent and St Joseph's School. So important was the occasion that special trains were organised from Brisbane Central, Ipswich and Goodna! Saint Joseph's Primary School opened the next day on 29th January with 50 students.

The Sisters teaching apostolate expanded over the years to include OLSH Junior Boys Boarding School at Corinda from 1919 to 1939, OLSH College Corinda from 1941 to 1972, which was a high school for girls, for both day students and boarding students, and also Our Lady of the Sacred Heart Primary School founded at Darra in 1937. Over the decades the Sisters were also involved in all aspects and ministries of the parish, as well as many ministries beyond the parish. In total over 150 Daughters of Our Lady of the Sacred Heart have lived and ministered in the parish in the past 106 years.

Unfortunately, due to the increasing age and declining health of many Sisters it was necessary to move to where nursing care is readily available. Other Sisters, fewer in number, are engaged in ministry elsewhere and are not free to come to Corinda Graceville at this time.

However the Sisters have partnered with St Vincent de Paul Queensland to use the convent to conduct wellbeing programs for women. This ministry which commenced in September 2021 is proving to be much needed and is filling a gap that had previously not been provided for in Brisbane. The Convent is known as the 'House of Hope'.

In acknowledgement of the ministry of the Daughters of Our Lady of the Sacred Heart in our parish for over a century and also of their continuing ministry in a new way to those in most need, the painting of Our Lady of the Sacred Heart (pictured right) has now been hung in the Martindale transept of St Joseph's Church.

May the Sacred Heart of Jesus be everywhere loved ~ forever! Our Lady of the Sacred Heart ~ pray for us.



Honouring the Word of God: One of the primary ways in which the faithful honour God's Word in the liturgy is by faithfully listening to the proclamation of the readings and the homily, and by discerning the various ways in which God's Word applies to their lives.

Within the liturgical celebration itself, the Church's General Instruction of the Roman Missal offers concrete guidelines for honouring God's Word at Mass. One most visual sign is proclaiming the Word from a dignified Lectionary or a specially decorated Book of the Gospels at the ambo.

Holding the Book of the Gospels aloft during the entrance procession and carrying the Book from the Mass altar to the ambo during the singing of the Gospel Acclamation is a way of highlighting the Lord's Word to be proclaimed.

Incensing the open Book of the Gospels and arranging servers to hold lighted candles on either side of the ambo are ways of reverencing the sacredness and light of Christ's presence during the proclamation of the Gospel.

As a sign of love for Christ and his message, the Book containing the Gospel reading is also kissed by the priest or deacon after the reading, like the altar which is venerated by the presiding celebrant at the beginning and end of Mass.

Pope Francis' Apostolic Letter Aperuit Illis suggests that on Sunday of the Word of God, the book containing God's Word might be "enthroned" or given due honour in the church. It is a point also made in Benedict XVI's Apostolic Exhortation Verbum Domini, so the faithful can reflect upon God's Word.

An important point to remember here is the Second Vatican Council's insight that Christ's presence is recognised in the actual "proclamation" of the Word, when the Church believes that Christ is present and speaking to those assembled through the words of the Church's minister [Sacrosanctum concilium], rather than in the physical book itself.

Aperuit Illis also reminds us that for many centuries before being written down, God's Word was passed down orally from one generation to another. Therefore the actions of proclamation, listening and heeding God's Word are still accorded high priority.

The other ways in which due honour might be given to God's Word including placing the Lectionary or Book of the Gospels on a significant stand near the ambo or entry to the church, in a dedicated side chapel or in the Blessed Sacrament Chapel, for people to read.

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The 2023-25 Sacraments of Initiation program - run by the Catholic Parish of Corinda Graceville - is for all children who are baptised and have turned 8 years of age by July 1, 2023, (usually Grade 3 children and above), regardless of which school they attend. The premise under which this policy is implemented within our Parish, is about inviting children to complete their initiation into the Catholic faith as part of a parish based, school supported, family centred preparation program. We will be working together as a team to continue your child's faith journey.

An information night is proposed for 6:30pm 16 March 2023, at Christ the King Church, Churchill Street, Graceville, for parents who would like to find out more about the program (Confirmation, First Holy Communion and Penance) and the process for enrolling their child/children in the same. Important information regarding the program will be provided at this night, so at least one parent or guardian should attend so that you may be in the best possible position to make an informed decision on whether your family wish to commit to the program at this time. Only parents/guardians need attend this short session.
