The Pastor's Ten....

This weekend is National Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Sunday. The official position of our National Catholic Church leadership is a yes for the coming Voice Referendum. Every one of us will be able to have our own say, based on our own consciences and convictions, when the Referendum is called. I hope that, taking our voting power seriously, a power many are across the world are denied, each of us will do all we reasonably can to read up and discuss with others the question this referendum puts and cast our vote in best conscience. I can't help but think, having seen what's going on elsewhere in the world at this time, how very blessed we are to have the privilege of having our say. I remain very grateful to all who fought so hard and to those who still do, for us to keep and exercise our democratic privilege in a world of despots and totalitarian ideologues.

Last year on this Sunday I told you of a friend from my school days in Maryborough. He was indigenous to this land and I learnt much from him. When we visited K'gari on a school trip (aged about 14 years) he opened my eyes to the long, deep and enduring connection he had with that Island and this country. I still have much more to learn and further to grow in my understanding and appreciation of Australia's First Peoples (as I'm sure many do) and I remain grateful for his friendship and generosity all of these decades latter.

Our readings are about welcoming, being hospitable and generous to strangers and to people in need. A woman helped take care of the Prophet Elisha, providing him shelter and food as he went about his mission in a foreign land and culture. Jesus tells his Twelve Apostles that when they are welcomed and cared for on their mission, it is Jesus Himself who is welcomed, and God the Father, too. Jesus adds that those who offer so much as a cup of cold water to his disciples will most certainly not lose their reward.

Archbishop Mark Coleridge at the recent Summit in May of this year named seven areas where we can become even better as welcoming Church. These Priorities are; 1. Teaching Prayer. 2. Reshaping Parish Communities. 3. Bringing Cultural Communities to the Centre. 4. Responding to Abuse and to the Abused. 5. Engaging Anew with First Nations Peoples. 6. Implementing Integral Ecology. 7. Enabling Synodal Governance. Over the seven weeks of Easter-time this newsletter printed information for you about each of these priorities.

These priorities are now part of our upcoming Parish Assembly thinking and considerations......How do we apply these seven priorities in our own Parish now? What/which are we doing well? What/which can we do more and do better? What/ which aren't we doing well, or even doing at all? What is within our local power to enact? What requires help and action from other Archdiocesan forums and agencies? Thinking and praying caps on about these now, please.

I invite and call on all members of our local Body of Christ to come to our Second Parish Assembly on Sunday 16th July 11.00am-1.30pm followed by a shared lunch with the acknowledgement of the 100 years since the foundation of Corinda Parish, now integrated into our greater Corinda Graceville Catholic Community. 

A new life in Christ...... Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Sunday

Every year, on the first Sunday in July, Catholics come together across Australia to acknowledge and celebrate the gifts of Australia's First Peoples in the Catholic Church. As we approach the Indigenous Voice to Parliament, it has never been more important for Catholics to come together and listen to Australia's First Peoples.

The 2023 theme for Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Sunday is 'A New Life in Christ'. It relates to the transformative possibilities that come when we walk God's Way of love. At this time in Australia's Reconciliation journey, we see signs of new life – the Uluru Statement's invitation to walk together "for a better future" is being taken up and its call to join in listening, truth-telling and agreement making is growing louder.

Learning to listen to First Nations people tell their stories is important to understanding the truth about their lives, histories and hopes for the future. While there are common themes, particularly concerning the injustices First Nations Peoples have faced and continue to face, their stories are as unique as their Language and Cultures.

One Journey, Together

This year, Australians will be asked to cast a vote on the proposed alteration to the Constitution to recognise the First Peoples of Australia by establishing an Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Voice. Like all Australians, Catholics have an important role to play in the upcoming Referendum

The tradition of Catholic Social Teaching well-equips Catholics to make informed decisions based on their own faith and moral positions. With Catholic Social Teaching Principles in mind and in partnership with Caritas Australia and a number of other Catholic organisations, a website has been developed hosting a range of resources to help you decide for or against acknowledging the world's oldest continuing cultures in our Constitution. It is hoped that, however we vote, we take this One Journey, Together.

Message from the Archbishop endorsing the Uluru Statement

Ahead of NAIDOC Week (July2-9), Catholics celebrate Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Sunday, as we come together across Australia to acknowledge and celebrate the gifts of Australia's First Peoples in the Catholic Church. As we approach the Indigenous Voice to Parliament, it has never been more important for Catholics to come together and listen to Australia's First Peoples. Archbishop Mark has prepared a message in which he once again states his endorsement of the Uluru Statement from the Heart. The message is printed below:

Australia as a nation is at a delicate and important moment in our history as we move towards the referendum on "The Voice" and all that it entails.

The call for a 'Voice' goes back to at least 2017 and to a National Constitutional Convention which produced what we know as the 'Uluru Statement from the Heart', which speaks of three things — Voice, Truth Telling and Treaty; three elements that are intimately related. The call for a 'Voice' in fact goes back much earlier, so there is quite some history to what we are going to do in this year as we come to the referendum.

I would urge all of you to read the 'Statement from the Heart'. Many people have read about it but not everyone has read the statement. It's not long; it's one page, and it's a powerful and in some ways quite beautiful statement. I would urge you all to read or to read again, and carefully, the statement, which is really our indigenous peoples offering a hand to the entire nation. This isn't just about the 3% who identify as indigenous; it's about the 100% who identify as Australians. This is about the whole nation.

The statement has been endorsed by me personally and I renew that endorsement here. It has been endorsed also by the Catholic Bishops of Australia. So with that endorsement, my prayer is that we can journey together in a respectful and peaceful spirit so that the whole nation can become stronger as a result of this process of reconciliation.

Resource to discuss "The Uluru Statement from the Heart"

Dovetailing nicely with the Archbishop's message for NAIDOC Week, Evangelisation Brisbane have worked in concert with the Edmund Rice Centre in Sydney to produce a resource that helps people unpack the Uluru Statement from the Heart.

This is one way to prepare for the National Referendum on constitutional recognition and the establishment of a Voice to Parliament which will likely take place in the latter part of the year. Here is the link and document of the Discussion Series: https://evangelisationbrisbane.org.au/assets/uploads/statement-of-the-heart-discussion.pdf It works similarly to a Lenten or Advent reflection series, where participants are lead through a process of prayer, scripture reflections and discussion questions, while exploring the Uluru Statement From the Heart.

We acknowledge the Traditional Custodians, the Yuggera and Turrbal peoples, who have walked upon and cared for this land for thousands of years. We acknowledge the continued deep spiritual attachment and relationship of Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Peoples to this country and commit ourselves to the ongoing journey of Reconciliation.


