The Pastor's Ten....

Our Parish Feast of Nations celebration happens this Sunday in St. Joseph's Hall from 11.30am onwards. This gathering matters much more than we might at first think. Yes, it celebrates the cultural and linguistic diversity of our contemporary Parish community through a sharing of dances, songs, stories, food and table fellowship, a good thing in and of itself, but it goes even further than this.

We know that we live in a world divided and at war in many ways and on so many fronts. That we, as a Church community, can overcome these differences and tensions because of our common faith in Jesus Christ is no small matter indeed. Our gathering at Mass and later on in the Hall turns this into a sacramental event; a moment of encounter with the crucified and risen Lord, an experience and a sign of what the Kingdom of God is like.

This get-together is a true celebration then, one which takes our communion with God and each other in Christ and his Eucharist, then acts out the meaning of all of this during our time spent together with our different races and cultures sharing respect and appreciation for each other.

Resentment and anger are foul things, and both are found with the sinner, says the First Reading. They are foul because they fester within us until they ooze up in conflict, hatred and warfare. Being together in service, appreciation, joy and love strikes a small but important blow against such evil and offers to us a foretaste of the unity, justice and peace of God's kingdom reign already amongst us.

St. Peter wanted to know how often he and Jesus' followers had to forgive, as much as seven times, he asked? Jesus answered, not seven times, but seventy-seven times!

In other words, forgiveness is to be without limits, for we have been forgiven so very much. This being so, what gives us the right and the power to refuse to forgive and to keep bound in their faults and failings one of our sisters or brothers, a fellow human? We have to start from this stand-point and with this understanding and goal in mind and heart so that we can imitate God, be more like Christ and overcome our part in fouling up our relationships and our bit of the world.

Keep the following simple model in mind; Christ is the sacrament of God to the world; the Church is the sacrament of Christ left in the world; we are part of the Church, so when we act and choose God's way in the strength of the Holy Spirit we are a sacrament to others; for a sacrament is a visible and effective sign of the very real but as yet invisible God and the working of God's grace in human lives and history.

Our Psalm Response is this weekend's message; The Lord is kind and merciful, slow to anger and rich in compassion. Likewise, with God's help, we are to become the Fr. Mark Percival. MA, PP. same.

Australia as a nation is at a delicate and important moment in our history as we move towards the referendum on "The Voice" and all that it entails. The call for a 'Voice' goes back to at least 2017 and to a National Constitutional Convention which produced what we know as the 'Uluru Statement from the Heart', which speaks of three things — Voice, Truth Telling and Treaty; three elements that are intimately related. The call for a 'Voice' in fact goes back much earlier, so there is quite some history to what we are going to do in this year as we come to the referendum.

I would urge all of you to read the 'Statement from the Heart'. Many people have read about it but not everyone has read the statement. It's not long; it's a powerful and in some ways quite beautiful statement. I would urge you all to read or to read again, and carefully, the statement, which is really our indigenous peoples offering a hand to the entire nation. This is about the whole nation.

ULURU STATEMENT FROM THE HEART Uluru 27 May 2017

We, gathered at the 2017 National Constitutional Convention, coming from all points of the southern sky, make this statement from the heart:

Our Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander tribes were the first sovereign Nations of the Australian continent, and its adjacent islands and possessed it under our own laws and customs. This our ancestors did, according to the reckoning of our culture, from the Creation, according to the common law from 'time immemorial', and according to science more than 60,000 years ago.

This sovereignty is a spiritual notion: the ancestral tie between the land, or 'mother nature', and the Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander peoples who were born therefrom, remain attached thereto, and must one day return thither to be united with our ancestors. This link is the basis of the ownership of the soil, or better, of sovereignty. It has never been ceded or extinguished, and co-exists with the sovereignty of the Crown.

How could it be otherwise? That peoples possessed a land for sixty millennia and this sacred link disappears from world history in merely the last two hundred years?

With substantive constitutional change and structural reform, we believe this ancient sovereignty can shine through as a fuller expression of Australia's nationhood.

Proportionally, we are the most incarcerated people on the planet. We are not an innately criminal people. Our children are aliened from their families at unprecedented rates. This cannot be because we have no love for them. And our youth languish in detention in obscene numbers. They should be our hope for the future.

These dimensions of our crisis tell plainly the structural nature of our problem. This is the torment of our powerlessness.

We seek constitutional reforms to empower our people and take a rightful place in our own country. When we have power over our destiny our children will flourish. They will walk in two worlds and their culture will be a gift to their country.

We call for the establishment of a First Nations Voice enshrined in the Constitution.

Makarrata is the culmination of our agenda: the coming together after a struggle. It captures our aspirations for a fair and truthful relationship with the people of Australia and a better future for our children based on justice and self-determination.

We seek a Makarrata Commission to supervise a process of agreement making between governments and First Nations and truth-telling about our history.

In 1967 we were counted, in 2017 we seek to be heard. We leave base camp and start our trek across this vast country. We invite you to walk with us in a movement of the Australian people for a better future.

Resource to discuss "The Uluru Statement from the Heart"

Evangelisation Brisbane have worked in concert with the Edmund Rice Centre in Sydney to produce a resource that helps people unpack the Uluru Statement from the Heart.

This is one way to prepare for the National Referendum on constitutional recognition and the establishment of a Voice to Parliament. One Journey, Together

This year, Australians are asked to cast a vote on the proposed alteration to the Constitution to recognise the First Peoples of Australia by establishing an Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Voice. Like all Australians, Catholics have an important role to play in the upcoming Referendum

The tradition of Catholic Social Teaching well-equips Catholics to make informed decisions based on their own faith and moral positions. With Catholic Social Teaching Principles in mind and in partnership with Caritas Australia and a number of other Catholic organisations, a website has been developed hosting a range of resources to help you decide for or against acknowledging the world's oldest continuing cultures in our Constitution. It is hoped that, however we vote, we take this One Journey, Together.

World Refugee and Migrant Sunday: next weekend 23rd / 24th September. In this year's World Day for Migrants and Refugees Message, Pope Francis focuses on the theme, "Free to choose whether to migrate or to stay." In the message he points out that for a healthy society there should always be "the freedom that should always mark the decision to leave one's native land." Migration movements throughout the world continue unabated. The Pope insists that we should always be "ensuring that that freedom is a widely shared pastoral concern." Pope Francis reminds us that St John Paul II stated that there should be a real commitment "to safeguarding first of all the right not to emigrate, that is, the right to live in peace and dignity in one's own country." The Pope stated that "the migrant is not simply a brother or sister in difficulty, but Christ himself, who knocks at our door." We are to construct "bridges and not walls, expanding channels for a safe and regular migration."

Multicultural Mass: This year's Multicultural Mass will be held on Sunday 24th September, presided by Archbishop Mark Coleridge and concelebrated by priests ministering to cultural communities throughout the Archdiocese. The Mass is held annually in recognition of World Day of Migrant and Refugees and will this year highlight the 2023 theme "Free to choose whether to migrate or to stay". Sunday September 24 at 2.30pm at the Cathedral of St Stephen, 249 Elizabeth St, City. RSVP: app.tickets.org.au/eb/MCM23 Mass will be followed by cultural performances and refreshments in the cathedral grounds. Parishioners from any and all cultural backgrounds are encouraged to attend to celebrate the richness of Brisbane's diverse Archdiocese.

If you touch the \$5.00, \$10.00, or \$20.00 amounts the screen will prompt you to tap your card for that chosen amount and it will show that your transaction has been successful.

If you touch 'other amount' the screen will prompt you to type in the amount you wish to donate and then you simply tap your card when the screen is ready.
