The Pastor's Ten....

Yet another attempt to trick and trap Jesus out in what he taught. Yet another failure to do so on behalf of the Chief Priests, Scribes, Sadducees and this time the Pharisees. They asked; Master, what is the greatest commandment of the Law? Here we're talking about the Law of God which in those times was also the Law of daily life for the Jewish people and community.

I have no idea what the Pharisee group imagined that Jesus might have answered, but what he did answer with was the undisputed core of all Divine Law: our love of and submission to God who has made us and loves us utterly. Jesus then joined this greatest of commandments to another that is found in the Old Testament/the Hebrew Scriptures, namely, that we must also to love our neighbour as we love ourselves.

The novelty that Jesus introduced here is in putting these two commandments beside each other, making them dependent on each other. In other words, if we do love and submit ourselves to God then we must act lovingly towards others, and if we do act justly, kindly and generously towards others then we are showing and deepening our love for God. Jesus ends by saying that everything that can ever be revealed, said and taught from God's Law hangs upon these two commandments, now forever bound together as one.

Our love for God shown in our practical love and care for others, especially persons in trouble and distress as I hinted above, is based on and draws from God's love for us. Sadly, we've become used to hearing and reading this message. So, let's try this differently. Yes, we are created good, we do have problems, challenges and too often make a mess of things, but we remain always good and loved by God. To put this another way, we have to hear that God actually likes us. Even if we don't like ourselves, even when others don't like us very much, God always does. This doesn't mean that God likes and approves of everything we say and do, but it does mean that God always likes us even despite what we do and say or the good we fail to say and do.

This is the nature of God's unconditional love and acceptance, the basis of our salvation in Christ, the source of our love of God and the strength of God within us for loving, helping and serving each other. What I've written here bears prayerful consideration, so I'll end my words to you with the short but powerful Opening Prayer of the Mass for this weekend.

Almighty ever-living God, increase our faith, hope and charity, and make us love what you command, so that we may merit what you promise. Through our Lord Jesus Christ, your Son, who lives and reigns with you in the unity of the Holy Spirit, one God, for ever and ever Amen.

Archbishop Mark has a message for you: One of the priorities I've put before the Archdiocese is the <u>teaching of prayer</u>. It's not enough to exhort or encourage people to pray: we have to teach them how. The apostles asked Jesus to teach them to pray, and we need it even more than they did. Jesus taught them to pray, and in the end he's only one who can teach us to pray – chiefly by drawing us into his own prayer. We need to be taught to pray because sin is like a stroke. After a stroke, people have to re-learn the most basic skills of life, like how to speak. Prayer is the most natural thing of all for the human being, but because of the stroke of sin we need to re-learn how to pray. Christian prayer begins not with speaking but with listening to the voice of Jesus; speaking comes only after that. Therefore, we need to learn how to listen, and that's not easy in such a noisy culture. It means we have to learn to be still and silent, and that's not easy either. But it can be taught and learnt; and over time the rewards of that teaching and learning are remarkable. We see the world and everything in it differently. We even see God.

Some thoughts on our recent Reflection Morning on Prayer:

On Saturday 14th November I took time out to attend the "spirituality morning" offered at St Joseph's Church. Sr Gerardine Doherty olsh, facilitated the morning titled, "In God we live and move and have our being!" The time was an opportunity for reflection, for quietness, for journeying and a moment to "let our hearts breathe the breath of God".

I appreciate many of you would have been sitting on the sidelines of sporting fields or transporting children to or from events during this time, so I wanted to provide an insight into this excellent presentation. While there is so much I'd like to share, I want to focus on the work of Wendy Wright who is currently Professor of Theology at Creighton University in Omaha, Nebraska. Professor Wright has expertise in the area of Family Spirituality and Sr Gerardine shared the idea of "snapshot moments". Recognising that "fleeing the world is not an option", we need to seek, search and find the sacred moments within family life.

In the midst of preparing dinner, putting on a load of washing or transporting the next child to training or a music lesson, it is sometimes difficult to find silence and stillness. Professor Wright suggests that it is precisely in these moments; these sacred moments, these family moments that God is with us. "We have no other way to God other than through the ordinary fabrics of our lives".

For me, this opportunity challenged me to be more aware of the sacred moments, the sacred places and the stillness and silence in the ordinariness of our lives each and every day. Taking time to notice and appreciate that God is right here, right now calling us to holiness.
