
## The Pastor's Pen....

Let us look at this weekend's Scripture readings, beginning with the Gospel. St. Mark is the main Gospel that we'll be reading and hearing this year with a 'top up' from St. John's Chapter 6. The brevity of Mark's sixteen chapter work makes this a necessity if we are going to get through the thirty three Ordinary Time weeks of our Church year.

We might think that what we hear this weekend from St. Mark is the same as what we heard last weekend from St. John. True enough, both stories do tell of the first disciples of Jesus coming to join him as their Teacher and learning his way. Apart from this theme though, the two Gospels couldn't be more different. John's focus is on the Baptist by the River Jordan pointing out to his disciples who the Lamb of God is, then letting go of his followers and position (mission mostly accomplished) so that Jesus would grow in prominence and he, John the Baptist, decrease. Last weekend's story was all about Jesus' identity as the sacrificial Lamb, prepared for by John and now overtaking his place.

This weekend St. Mark puts us with Jesus by the Sea of Galilee somewhere near the town of Capernaum, after the arrest and imprisonment of John the Baptist by King Herod. We have middle class small business men who were in the important fishing industry of their time. Jesus is already preaching that God's Kingdom is at hand and so, coming to the Galilee seaside, he sees the two pairs of brothers, Simon (Peter) and Andrew and the sons of Zebedee, James and John. They're casting and repairing their nets near to their boats.

Listening carefully, we find that there is no 'Lamb of God' announcement by the Baptist nor any sending of his disciples to go with Jesus and leave him behind. Instead, the focus is firmly fixed on Jesus' direct call



In the Old Testament First Reading from the book of the Prophet Jonah, we meet a man who did everything he possibly could to avoid God's calling. God had asked him to go preach repentance to the great City of Nineveh in Iraq. Instead, Jonah caught a boat headed for Spain, got himself thrown overboard in a storm because the crew thought he was bad luck, was then swallowed by the whale (big sea creature) and finally, three days later, he was spat out on the beach just South of Tel Aviv, right back where he'd started from.

He then, resentfully, went to Nineveh, preached the shortest, most uninspired homily he could......and it worked. The entire City repented and God saved them from destruction. This is exactly what Jonah had thought would happen because he knew how kind and merciful God was, even to foreigners and pagans such as the people of Nineveh. Jonah then went into the desert, sat under a tree and wished he could die. Yet, even this didn't work out because God had other plans for him, for all people and for all of creation.

Jonah is a short, easy read, a story of God's patience and mercy, our human weaknesses and God's ability to bring the best out of the mess we make. Jesus loved the Book of Jonah, quoting it when comparing his own life and destiny to that of this prophet.

I strongly recommend that you read Jonah, having a good laugh at ourselves as we better realise God's wisdom, plan and power. Perhaps reading the Book of Jonah will help us to be more like Andrew, Peter, James and John in our response to God's Word and Jesus' call, today and every day. Have a happy, worthwhile week ahead.




